



## **Work in fragile contexts**

After a politically turbulent year in 2021, we were hoping for things to improve in the new year. However, the situation in our partner countries remains highly fragile – which makes our work challenging.

Governments brutally crushed opposition protests in Chad and Bangladesh in 2022, while in Afghanistan, the Taliban continued to relentlessly restrict the freedom of girls and women. The situation likewise remains unstable in the multi-ethnic state of Ethiopia, where civil war was waged for two years. In addition, the ongoing drought in the Horn of Africa caused one of the worst climate-related crises in recent history, whereas the rainy season in Chad lasted longer than average. The consequences: hundreds of thousands of people had to leave their homes, entire areas were cut off from their surroundings and there were more and more severe cases of malaria.

Cooperation with our local partners and employees is crucial for us to be able to engage effectively in these challenging situations. They are the ones who are able to assess the security situation and make recommendations or alleviate a situation. We are therefore delighted that we have been able to continue with all of our projects in 2022 – above all thanks to these partners. Inflation has forced us to increase project budgets in some cases, for example to offset higher prices for pharmaceuticals. This makes it all the more motivating for us to see that, in spite of all the challenges, our projects are having an impact and helping local girls and women to improve their health and enjoy more rights.

The work being done in the "Gender Equality & Health" alliance, founded in 2019, which includes IAMANEH Switzerland and Médecins du Monde Suisse, is beginning to bear fruit. For example, we have collaborated to prevent sexual exploitation, abuse and harassment – both internally and with our partners. We have also expanded our country portfolio

After a lengthy period of online collaboration due to the Covid 19 pandemic, we were finally able to meet our partners in person again. The partner dialogue and project visits are extremely valuable to us and provide us with key insights for follow-up projects.






Afghanistan: Gender segregation is strictly observed. All the more important it is for our local partner to reach men too, with issues relating to pregnancy and childbirth.

# Key data 2022

### Strengthening health systems



## Access to and use of health services

- **3,383 births** were assisted professionally in health-care facilities supported by Women's Hope.
- 8,120 women received at least one prenatal examination during their pregnancy, 5,798 women received postnatal care (at least one visit).
- 830 community health workers received maternal and child health courses.



## Strengthening health systems

- 38 health centres and posts as well as 4 hospitals and rehabilitation centres were supported (with e.g., medical devices and products, minor repairs, staff training).
- 72 midwife students received financial support for their training, while 34 midwives received further training.

### Raising people's awareness of fistulas

- 848 fistula operations and other childbirth injuries surgeries were performed.
- 407 patients underwent various rehabilitation measures while 261 participated in vocational training courses.
- 386 women were screened for obstetric fistula in diagnostic camps, 67 were diagnosed with fistula.
- 1,002 health workers were informed and trained on obstetric fistula.
- In addition, 695 traditional birth attendants and 4,395 mothers, teachers and community leaders were also trained.

## **Eliminating gender-based violence**



Raising awareness to eliminate child marriage (Bangladesh)

- 4,648 people, including men and boys, teachers and imams, have been sensitised and/or trained on children's rights, child marriages and gender-based violence.
- The 30 "safe spaces" we set up recorded 7,024 visits by girls, and 1,360 girls purchased discounted menstrual products during the visits.

## **Emergency interventions**



Drought crisis in East Africa: supporting the people of the Somali region of Ethiopia

- Eight health centres were supported to meet increased medical needs resulting from the influx of the large number of internally displaced persons.
- 478 households received kits with sanitary towels and toiletries such as soaps and toothbrushes.

# **Organisation**

As of the end of 2022, the Women's Hope International Head Office had seven permanent employees and one intern. With the country offices in Ethiopia and Chad, a total

of 12 people were working for Women's Hope at the end of 2022, equivalent to 9.3 full-time positions.

## Who we are

Every woman should have the chance to give birth to her child safely. Yet globally 800 women die every day due to complications during pregnancy or childbirth. 95% of these deaths occur in low and middle-income countries. Over 90% of these deaths are avoidable. This is where the work of Women's Hope International comes in.

### **Our work**

We are committed to ensuring that all women can exercise their right to a healthy and self-determined life. Together with local organizations, institutions and communities, we promote structures that strengthen the sexual and reproductive health and rights of girls and women.

- We strengthen local sexual and reproductive healthcare systems to enable employees to deliver high-quality services.
- We are committed to the elimination of gender-based violence, particularly forced marriage, child marriage and female genital mutilation.
- We provide girls and women with obstetric injuries and other medical conditions related to the birth of a child with access to specialised gynaecological treatment, preventive care and social integration measures.

### Our approach

Societies can only be stable and peaceful when everyone participates equally in political, economic and social life. No country in the world has yet achieved genuine equality – even though it is a human right. Through our work, we aim at equal rights and equal access to resources – especially medical resources – for everyone. In order to achieve this objective, women must be empowered as knowledge-bearers and decision-makers. We actively involve them and their social environment in project planning, implementation and evaluation. Women in particular and all members of the population in our partner countries know what is needed and how sustainable solutions look like. Working closely with local partners, we promote knowledge-sharing

and joint learning, strengthening interaction between local people and health services. Our work aims at enabling local communities to implement measures independently in the long term.

Our work contributes to the UN Sustainable Development Goals 3 (health and well-being) and 5 (gender equality).
